Speaker: Gillian Martin

Topic: How About Preventing Harm to Birds During Tree

Care

Gillian is the Director of the Cavity Conservation Initiative, a 501(c)3 organization in Southern California whose mission is to protect habitat for cavity-nesting birds. She is also the cofounder and leader of the Tree Care for Birds and Other Wildlife Project, a state-wide partnership

between wildlife advocates and the tree care industry to reduce impact to wildlife during tree care. She is a naturalist, bird activist, and public speaker. Her articles have been published in several professional journals and newsletters.

Gillian will give us information on good practices in tree trimming and suggestions on how to work in your yard with trimmers. Also check out these two booklets, on our website, published by LA Audubon. We will be glad to welcome landscapers, homeowners, and everyone who calls us concerned about nestlings to this important meeting!

### Thursday, May 24, 2018

Speaker: Lu Plauzoles
Topic: Snowy Plover Project

Lu Plauzoles, a 20-plus-year member of Santa Monica Bay Audubon, will introduce the Michael Love-produced 45-minute film "The Western Snowy Plover: Natural History and Recovery." The movie introduces you to the Snowy Plovers of the University of California Coal Oil Point Reserve in Goleta—the most successful breeding colony of plovers on the Pacific Coast.

The film includes an excellent introduction to the natural history of the Snowy Plovers by Dr. Cris Sandoval of UCSB and her staff. After the screening, Lu will give a short report and answer questions about the Snowy Plovers on our Los Angeles Beaches.

Lu heard Mary Prismon's pleas for these birds, and was trapped into the Snowy Plover Project in 2001 by Chuck Almdale's L.A. County Survey, and has not yet escaped its clutches. A graduate of UCLA, Lu holds two degrees unrelated to the plovers. However, he has logged extensive hours of observation, monitoring, and reporting of the "little guys," the smallest avian species on our beaches. He has also attended and participated in seven of the range-wide Snowy Plover meetings for the West Coast populations.

#### January and February Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

We traveled to Orange County on January 20, visiting Upper Newport Bay and San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The weather was cool and breezy. We observed fifteen species of waterfowl; the favorites being Northern Pintail, Redhead, Blue-winged Teal, Cinnamon Teal, Green-winged Teal, Lesser Scaup and Red-breasted Merganser. Our shorebird list was not up to expectations due to high tide prevailing during our birding time at UNB, but for the day we did manage a few special finds like Greater Yellowlegs, Long-billed Curlew, Marbled Godwit, American Avocet, Willet and Spotted Sandpiper. The most discussed raptors were Osprey and Peregrine. We scored Brown Pelican, American White Pelican, Horned Grebe, Sora (heard only), Belted Kingfisher, White-faced Ibis and Caspian Tern. Notable passerine species seen included Vermilion Flycatcher (at least three had been reported at SJWS this winter). Phainopepla, Say's Phoebe, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher and Hermit Thrush.

On February 17 we birded the Ventura County Game Preserve near Oxnard. A nice turnout of participants enjoyed perfect weather. We found twelve shorebird species with Lesser Yellowlegs, Dunlin, Wilson's Snipe, Greater Yellowlegs, Marbled Godwit, American Avocet and Long-billed Dowitcher creating the most interest. Favorites from our waterfowl sightings were Blue-winged Teal, Cinnamon Teal, Green-winged Teal, Northern Pintail and Northern Shoveler. We were successful in tallying a special target species here, American Bittern. Raptors were not in good supply this visit, but topping our list were Northern Harrier and Peregrine. Other species of note observed were White-faced Ibis, Loggerhead Shrike, Belted Kingfisher, American Pipit, Tree Swallow, Marsh Wren, Savannah Sparrow and Western Meadowlark. Checking through the scattered blackbird flocks, we saw only Brewer's, Red-winged and Brownheaded Cowbird...no Yellow-headed or Tricolored this year.


