Highlights of Birdathon Events for 2018

Five birders joined Heather Medvitz and Pat Avery for a Sunday morning stroll and sit at <u>Sepulveda Basin</u> that found 38 species including bright Bullock's Orioles, Cassin's Kingbirds, Pied-billed Grebes and Red-winged Blackbirds.

Art Langton was joined by six birders at Malibu Creek State Park. They identified 55 species including Ash-throated Flycatcher, Hutton's Vireo, Golden-crowned Sparrow and Lazuli Bunting,

Twelve birders joined Carolyn Oppenheimer for a walk in O'Melveny Park and found 33 species including Black-throated Gray Warbler, Nashville Warbler, Black-headed Grosbeak and Golden-crowned Sparrow.

Jim Moore conducted nine birders on his annual <u>Big Day in the Antelope Valley</u>. They tallied 129 species including excellent views of Great Horned Owl nestlings; Hooded, Common, and Red-breasted Mergansers; Soras; Solitary Sandpiper; Prairie Falcon and seven types of flycatchers (Western Wood Pewee, Hammond's, Pacific Slope, Black Phoebe, Say's Phoebe, Ash-throated, and Western Kingbird).

Richard Barth's trip to Morongo Valley and Black Rock Campground found 60 species including Pinyon Jays, singing Scott's Orioles, Vermilion Flycatchers, a singing Summer Tanager, over twenty Phainopeplas hovering around one tree and a Green-tailed Towhee. Continued next page.

Six birders joined Mark Osokow for his annual <u>Big Day in the Santa Susana Mountains and Simi Hills</u>. They tallied 75 species including Merlin, Lazuli Bunting, Phainopepla, Warbling Vireo, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Hermit Warbler, Blue Grosbeak, Rufous-crowned Sparrow, Great Horned Owl, Western Screech Owl, Barn Owl, and Common Poorwill.

Pat Bates and four birders found a large number of Lawrence's Goldfinches at <u>Hansen Dam</u>. They also saw a Yellow-breasted Chat and two nesting Phainopeplas. In total, they counted 39 different species.

John and Andrew Willis spent the day birding <u>Los Angeles and Long Beach Harbors</u> and came across a huge flock of Black Skimmers on the beach at Ocean Avenue and a Red-throated Loon at Alamitos Bay. In total, they found 51 species.

Twenty-eight birders joined Kris Ohlenkamp at <u>Sepulveda Basin</u> earning Kris the distinction of attracting the most participants. They saw both male and female Western Tanagers, Phainopepla, a male blue Grosbeak, a female Myrtle's variant of the Yellow-rumped Warbler and had great looks at an Olive-sided Flycatcher. In total, they identified 55 species.

Muriel and Alan Kotin completed their 24-hour marathon visit to birding sites in <u>Orange and Los Angeles Counties</u>. They nearly tripped over a Horned Lark at Bolsa Chica and observed an Eared Grebe in full breeding plumage. At Harriet Wieder Park they found a mating pair of tree swallows before they even got out of the car. In total, they identified 97 species.

Art Langton completed a one-man, personal Birdathon along <u>State Route 33 from McGrath State Beach to Ozema Ranger Station</u> in Los Padres National Forest. He made stops at Ventura Marina, Cañada Larga, Ojai Meadows, and Wheeler Gorge. Due to fire damage further up the road, Wheeler Gorge is currently the end of good birding on this trek. In total, he saw 68 species.

Birdathon leaders and participants were rewarded by directly experiencing the broad diversity of habitat and number of bird species found in our region. Birdathon, our only fundraising event of the year, supports our vital education and conservation programs. Your contribution will enable SFVAS to continue to educate the public about bird identification and the importance of protecting bird wildlife habitat.

Report on March and April Field Trips by Richard Barth

March 17 & 18 marked our Morro Bay Weekend, essentially a three-day event with some of us tallying sightings on Friday as well. There were short periods of rain on Friday and Saturday, but Sunday's weather was almost perfect. For the trip we found 99 species, plus an interesting hybrid. Target species Pigeon Guillemot, Brant, Chestnut-backed Chickadee and Peregrine were present and accounted for. Our shorebird list totaled fourteen species while our waterfowl list numbered thirteen including Greater Scaup and a recently-reported hybrid Blue-winged X Cinnamon Teal. Other special sightings included Common Loon (with one individual in full breeding plumage), Red-throated Loon, Black Oystercatcher, Brandt's Cormorant, Pelagic Cormorant, White-tailed Kite, Osprey, Fox Sparrow and Purple Finch. Also of some note: Belted Kingfisher, Wrentit, California Quail, Hermit Thrush, California Thrasher, Goldencrowned Sparrow and Western Meadowlark. We were successful in finding a cooperative Canyon Wren on Morro Rock this year, and got lucky with a Brown Creeper at the State Park Campground.

On April 21 we traveled to the high desert north of Palm Springs and birded the Big Morongo Valley Preserve, nearby Covington Park and neighborhood, and after lunch Black Rock Campground in Joshua Tree National Park. The day's efforts served as an SFVAS Birdathon, producing 60 species under glorious weather conditions. Highlight sightings for the day were Scott's Oriole, Summer Tanager, Pinyon Jay, Vermilion Flycatcher, Bell's Vireo, Green-tailed Towhee, Verdin, Lawrence's Goldfinch, Yellow-breasted Chat, White-throated Sparrow, Cactus Wren and White-winged Dove. We were treated to a migratory fall-out of at least twenty Phainopeplas. Also tallied were Gambel's Quail, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Lazuli Bunting, Hooded Oriole, Bullock's Oriole, Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Tanager, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Black-chinned Hummingbird, Costa's Hummingbird, Lark Sparrow and Lincoln's Sparrow. Topping our warbler list were Nashville, Yellow, Wilson's and Black-throated Gray. Other species of interest found: American Kestrel (one carrying a large lizard), California Thrasher, Chipping Sparrow, Western Bluebird and Pacific-slope Flycatcher.

Proposition 68 Will Fund Numerous Local and Statewide Conservation Priorities

SFVAS is joining Audubon California and a broad coalition of conservation organizations in supporting Proposition 68 on the June 5 California ballot. These groups have cited numerous potential benefits to California's birds and other natural treasures, as well as the state's residents. Called the California Clean Water & Safe Parks Act, Proposition 68 is a \$4 billion bond measure that will fund a number of important priorities for Californians, including local, regional and state parks, clean drinking water projects, flood protection, and habitat projects that are vital to the state's diverse wildlife.

The cycle of drought and extreme weather is already taking a toll on California's natural treasures and threatens our communities with flooding and ecological degradation. These same forces have also exposed our state's antiquated water infrastructure, bringing into doubt our ability to provide clean, safe, and reliable drinking water to our residents. Lastly, with most of the bond funding for vital conservation programs running out in the last few years, it is time for Californians to make the next investment in the protection of the natural resources that make California's parks and open spaces destinations for millions of visitors every year.

For the birds of the Pacific Flyway, and the roughly one million people living around the Salton Sea, Prop. 68 has profound importance. The bond measure includes \$200 million for vitally important dust mitigation and habitat restoration at the Salton Sea, where water diversions are creating a public health disaster and destroying habitat. Last year, the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society adopted a new mission statement, which consists of three major components. The first reads, "To promote the conservation of natural resources and to preserve and enhance wildlife habitats and biodiversity." One of the many ways the Chapter can pursue its mission is to provide financial support to other conservation-related organizations with complementary missions, using its financial assets accumulated through donations both large and small, and both recent and from the earliest days of the Chapter's history. Although the Chapter has, throughout its history, supported other conservation-minded organizations, the Chapter's Board of Directors has identified a few worthy non-profit organizations whose purposes and activities exemplify our mission statement and further our goals. The Chapter hopes that our ongoing support of these organizations will create a synergy that benefits our local communities and our local wildlife. Future issues of the *Phainopepla* will include details about the donations, as well as more information about these organizations. But first, we wanted to share how the Chapter has come to be in a position to offer concrete support to like-minded organizations.

As many of you already know, the Chapter has a long, proud history, and is over 100 years old. Donations made to the Chapter in the first half of its existence, thanks to strong economic growth and wise investment strategies, have yielded good returns. In later years, the Chapter was the beneficiary of two thoughtful members who generously included the Chapter in their estate-planning. Marjorie Holmes, an active member for many years, left her estate to the Chapter, including her home in Mission Hills, with hopes that it could be turned into a nature center. Unfortunately the home was badly damaged in the Northridge earthquake, making it impossible to realize her original vision. However, proceeds from the sale of the home added to the assets of the Chapter. And just a few years ago, Joyce McKinnon, a retired operating room nurse, who was a very active member of the Chapter, and served as Recording Secretary and Director-at-Large, as well as a naturalist in SBEEP, remembered the Chapter in her estate planning as well.

As a general rule the Chapter strives to "break even" each year. Although the Chapter's ongoing activities, including annual operational costs and SBEEP, are supported by member dues supplemented by proceeds from our annual Birdathon, the Chapter is now able to make more substantial "investments" in other conservation-minded organizations, thanks to the many individuals who have supported it with their donations over the years. We thank you, and the birds do, too!


