He has been an active docent at the Conservancy since 2013 and brings both an intellectual as well as an adventurous spirit to his work on the ranch. He is as comfortable talking about the intriguing history of the ranch as he is leading birding and driving tours on some of the Ranch's loneliest backroads.



Speaker: Frank Hoffman Topic: Falconry Today

Frank Hoffman is a full-time employee of the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation and is the Recreation Services Supervisor working at the Placerita Canyon Natural Area in Newhall. In addition, Frank is also the current Treasurer and Field Meet Registration Co-Chair (formally the Membership Co-Chair too) for the California Hawking Club, the only state recognized Falconry Club in California. He has been practicing the Art of Falconry for most of his adult life and is a Master Falconer, maintaining a beautiful Harlan's Red-tailed Hawk that was wild trapped in the Antelope Valley 13 years ago, though she's not flying right now due to the annual molt that birds go through every year. He is also a California State Licensed Hunter, a requirement of all Falconers.



His presentation will feature some history of Falconry, modern falconry as it's practiced today, conservation efforts by falconers, the different birds employed by falconers, equipment used "furniture" in the practice, and common issues and problems that modern falconers face today.





January and February Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

We visited Upper Newport Bay and San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on January 19. Our headliner at Upper Newport was a juvenile Reddish Egret, a surprise for us there. Other species of special interest at the bay were Black Skimmer, Osprey, White-tailed Kite and Northern Harrier. At San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary our most notable tallies were Palm Warbler and Vermilion Flycatcher, both of which had been previously reported. Phainopepla and Blue-gray Gnatcatcher also made our list at the sanctuary. For the day our waterfowl species total was only ten this year with Northern Pintail and Green-winged Teal probably the most interesting. American Wigeon was by far the most abundant of the ducks (hundreds present). American Avocet, Greater Yellowlegs, Spotted Sandpiper, Willet, Marbled Godwit and Long-billed Curlew topped our list of shorebirds.

February 16 marked our trip to Ventura County Game Preserve near Oxnard. Beautiful clear weather greeted us, then some distracting winds developed in the late morning. We were disappointed to find only seven species of waterfowl, but we covered only about 1/4 of this vast property. Invigorating was the spring return of many Cliff and Tree Swallows. Our wintering shorebirds were Black-necked Stilt, Long-billed Dowitcher, Greater Yellowlegs, Killdeer, Marbled Godwit, Western Sandpiper and Least Sandpiper. White-faced Ibis flocks were impressive (well over 100 birds seen). Lots of Northern Harrier action entertained us and Red-tailed Hawk was the most abundant raptor present. We had good studies of American Pipit and Savannah Sparrow. Honorable mention species were Marsh Wren, Western Meadowlark, White-throated Swift, Common Yellowthroat, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Say's Phoebe, Red-winged Blackbird, Turkey Vulture, Pied-billed Grebe and Eared Grebe.

Conservation Corner and Education

As both Conservation Chair and Chair of Classroom Education I'm driven by our Mission Statements -

- to promote the conservation of natural resources and to preserve and enhance wildlife habitats and biodiversity,
- to increase appreciation of bird life and the natural environment through education, presentations, guided bird walks and other activities, and
- to foster opportunities for a diverse population to come together for the protection and celebration of avian life

Therefore we feel responsible to support our Classroom Teachers in their goals as defined in the California Environmental Literacy Initiative (CAELI) to support and strengthen the role of environmental literacy in K-12 classroom instruction:

- The continuation and health of individual human lives and of human communities and societies depend on the health of the natural systems that provide essential goods and ecosystem services.
- The long-term functioning and health of terrestrial, freshwater, coastal and marine ecosystems are influenced by their relationships with human societies.
- Natural systems proceed through cycles that humans depend upon, benefit from and can alter.
- The exchange of matter between natural systems and human societies affects the long-term functioning of both.
- Decisions affecting resources and natural systems are based on a wide range of considerations and decision-making processes.

As can be seen, the CAELI topics and our Mission Statement overlap in many ways. SFVAS's frequent educational programs, including Birdwalks, Sepulveda Basin Environmental Education Program (SBEEP), classroom bird art programs, etc., attempt to communicate, in an engaging, age-appropriate way, the importance of environmental stewardship and its benefits to our lives and the lives of all our fellow species. We are proud to support the Initiative's goals and each of our Teachers.

As a footnote, please recall that our annual fundraising Birdathon will be soon, and your support of SBEEP and our other ongoing programs will be sincerely appreciated.
